Open House and Reed L. Buffington Visual and Performing Arts Center Building Dedication

Chabot College invited the community to its Open House and Building Dedication for the Reed L. Buffington Visual and Performing Arts Center on Wednesday, November 3.

Tours of new campus facilities began at 3 p.m. and highlighted the spectacular new 51,000 sq ft Community and Student Services Center Building, the new Instructional Office Building 700, and renovations of classrooms and athletic facilities.



At 5:15 p.m. the crowd gathered in front of the Visual and Performing Arts Center for light refreshments and the dedication ceremony honoring Reed L. Buffington, the founding President of Chabot College. Dr. Buffington was in attendance and expressed deep appreciation for the recognition granted him. He offered delightful anecdotes about the College's beginnings in 1961. Most notable was story that Chabot opened its first classes just 11 weeks after the college district was constituted and Dr. Buffington was hired to plan and implement the new college! He also joked about his strategy of squirreling away funds needed to start the new "Valley Campus" which evolved into Las Positas College.

State dignitaries who offered praise included Senator Ellen Corbett, former Chabot College student and faculty member, and Assemblymember Mary Hayashi, Chair of the Assembly Select Committee on Community Colleges. Assembly-

member Hayashi presented handsome framed Assembly resolutions honoring Dr. Buffington, and CARE President Helen Bridge shared personally expressive laudatory comments.

Barbara Francisco Mertes Center for the Arts Building Dedication

The occasion was for an Open House, and the dedication of the newest building on campus, the Center for the Arts, to Dr. Barbara Mertes. Starting at 3:00 pm, there were student-led campus tours, music was played, and folks had a chance to enjoy each other's company. At 5:15 pm, the formal portion of the program begun.

This is what everyone came to see, the official dedication of the Barbara Francisco Mertes Center of the Arts building.

With a gathering of approximately 200 people, there were many speeches during the next hour. Some were to recognize and honor the vision and leadership of our first leader of Chabot College-Valley Campus/Las Positas College. Others were to congratulate her on a lifetime of service and dedication to education. Some were to speak of her tenacity and "let's get this done" attitude throughout the years. And, one was to acknowledge the good spirit and energy that this 'fine lady' has.



The list of speakers included, among others, husband Dr. David Mertes, Congressman John Garamendi, Interim President Guy Lease, Chancellor Joel Kinnaman, Trustee President Donald Gelles, former Vice-President Don Milanese, and Faculty Emeritus Ken Ross. At the conclusion of the dedication ceremony, Dr. Barbara Mertes quietly and graciously said, "It is a wonderful tribute, and I am truly touched."

The Center for the Arts building is breathtakingly beautiful. As you enter, a wall of bamboo (20-ft tall) welcomes you into this spectacular building of steel and glass. There are numerous unique elements to this state-of-the-art performing arts facility. A few of the 'wow' elements are the costume shop, welding arts studio, a classroom with 24 pianos (each with individual headphones, so that no one is disturbed), a black box theater, and a stunning 500-seat theater. You must tour it to fully appreciate all that it has.

An American Dream

I was born in Los Angeles at the end of the great depression to parents who migrated to California in search of the American Dream. I didn't live that dream early on in my life. My father was a wounded WWI Veteran who spent much of his life in VA hospitals so mom and I lived as best we could. My first years were spent living with an aunt in a ramshackle house in Redondo Beach. When WWII broke out my father got out of the hospital, found housing managing a large apartment house and a job working for the Railroad. Mom was hired as a riveter in the aviation industry. In order to be closer to mom's factory we moved to a house in El Segundo where I attended preschool.



The dream faded when dad lost his job and returned to the VA hospital leaving mom and me homeless. In desperation mother moved us to an aunt's apartment in north Oakland and found work as a short order cook. With housing at a premium we were lucky to find tarpaper shack on the site of what is now the Oakland Main Library. Just before wars' end dad returned from the hospital and I started first grade at Lincoln Elementary School.

With the war about over my parents moved to San Francisco to managing the San Fran Hotel, a billet for returning servicemen, located in the heart of Chinatown. On VJ Day mom drug me down to Market Street to view the revelry. At war's end the hotel was closed and we were again homeless and jobless. I was sent to live with my aunt in Oakland again. Eventually the family moved back to Oakland. Dad found a job as a parking attendant and mom found work as a maid. We moved to a tiny one room apartment on Fourteenth and West Streets where I entered the second grade at Lafayette Elementary School. It was my fifth-sixth grade teacher who instilled in me the dream of becoming a teacher.

About a year later we moved to a three room apartment near the Oakland Central YMCA. I was very fortunate to learn to swim and later to teach others to swim for it afforded me the opportunity to swim competitively for ten years, setting national and international individual and relay records. The Y became my home. I trained three hours a day, six days a week and spent my summers at the Y camp in Loma Mar. To pay my way I sold soap door to door, delivered newspapers, worked as a camp councilor, maintenance worker, life guard and cook.

Because of my training schedule my studies at West Lake Junior High suffered. Conformity issues and post pubescence angst combined to make life confusing. The seventh grade was academically tough but the next year was worse. I was on the brink of being held back when my ninth grade English teacher intervened to help me with my class work and reinforced my interest in becoming a teacher.

At Oakland Technical High School I was tracked into industrial program. I rebelled, quit school, lied about my age and went to work for SP Railroad. That lasted about two weeks before I was discovered. A wise Roundhouse Forman sent me back to Tech. My school councilor agreed to let me return and take a few college prep classes. While I struggled, I managed to pass these classes and catch up to my class mates while earning two Block letters for swimming and a third place in the Hearst Examiner History Competition. My History Teacher helped me with my studies and encouraged me to become a teacher. As a senior, I headed up the rally squad and was a graduation speaker.

My girl friend encouraged me to go to college. However, on graduation day I went to work as a locomotive fireman with SP, fulfilling my childhood dream and moved to San Francisco, fulfilling another dream and entered SF State. I worked my way through college and law school while contributing to my family. At State I was elected as frosh VP and Sophomore President. As a junior I served on the student council; in my senior year I was elected Director of Student Activities and was inducted into the men's honor society. As a fifth year student I married my first wife, worked two full time jobs and finished college.

During my fifth year I volunteered for Nixon and interned for Congressman Millard who urged me to pursue a law degree. I went to Hastings College of Law where I attended for two years until finances and the birth of my second daughter

forced my withdrawal. I returned State to pursue a masters' in Political Science. I attended the 1964 Republican Convention but switched my affiliation to work on the Johnson campaign. While completing my master's degree my third daughter was born. I was admitted to a number of schools including the University of Iowa where I was awarded a small teaching fellowship but the stipend was not enough to support my growing family.

I looked for a community college position, but found none so I began applying to high school. I found one at Oakdale Union High School where I was given six classes of remedial US and World History students. After two years I was awarded an NDEA Summer fellowship to SF State. On the last day of the seminar I was chased down by an Education Professor I knew who told me about the position in the ISLS program at Chabot. I was hired by Dr. Buffington and taught in the Social Science Division for the next thirty-six years. I am blessed to have achieved my dreams and to have shared them with my wife of 32 years and our 23 year old son.
